

## Lowdown on Hot Topics from Mary Adams

SUPERVISOR Mary Adams has clout. She has chutzpah, and she has the courage to make that work for her. She gives all her presentations and pronouncements with style and grace. Charm works, and when it works for her, it's working for us.

In her few minutes of introduction, she rattled off a dozen projects, some large, some small, that consume the bulk of her days. There's the turmoil with LAFCO and Fort Ord, the water ownership issue with Measure J, affordable housing at the old Rancho Canada golf course and its 130 new units, mixed usage at a high end grocery store at the Crossroads, with underground parking possibilities, cannabis issues—and these are just a few.

Then there are the really controversial ones—fire prevention, traffic, general affordable housing. "When you talk about traffic, you really need a bullet-proof

vest," she noted. "The roundabout at the Grade is fully funded and work should start in 18 months. It will be handled differently from the Highway 1 project, which I call "the project from Hell."


She discussed traffic problems in the Village and plans on forming a group of business leaders to look at traffic in the area and possible speed changes. She noted that there will be a new stop light or a round-about at Brookdale and Carmel Valley Road for September Ranch development.

More changes for Highway 68 could see the installation of as many as nine round-abouts, and she urged her audience to let elected officials know how they felt about it.

She also mentioned some new wrinkles which bear observation: a planned Highway 1 "busway" to get people from Castroville to Costco using the old railroad tracks. Electric buses would go just one way in both the a.m. and p.m.

Homelessness and affordable housing presents a whole new dilemma which she had addressed during her years with United Way. "We have 7,000 kids in Monterey County who are homeless," she said. "Not just kids living in cars or hotels, but 4 and 5 member families sharing a single bed. Our new governor is working on it." She reflected a moment: "Housing, water, work force-we need the will to do it right." Short-term rentals elicited a response from her audience. "There should be a new ordinance in place by April," she announced, avoiding to say what it might say.

Campaign finance reform, cannabis growing in Cachagua, sales taxes going out of state to buyers' locations, the removal of dead and dying trees—there was much to hear and question in her brief hour of talk. And questions were asked. She responded in her usual diplomatic fashion. Of her opponents, she noted: "If they'd all just agree with me, everything would be better. I'm not a controversial person, but..."



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
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## Rotary Club of Carmel Valley Party

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
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


