

CVWC October Lunch at Earthbound Farms

A beautiful, bright, sunny day found CVWC members checking out the pumpkins, squash, strawberries, carrots and heavenly delicacies lain before them in sumptuous array at the October luncheon at Earthbound Farms. Over 35 people attended, with 4 new members welcomed.

The attraction, besides the good eats and drink, was CERT member Wanda Vollmer who prepared a memorable lecture on what to do in an emergency, specifically for our neck of the woods. Her group, the Certified Monterey Community Emergency Response Team, has a mission of meeting with individual families in their homes and outlining the best ways for them to defend themselves in a disaster.

The timing was perfect, in that we Western seaboard homeowners were acknowledging the 30th anniversary of the Loma Prieta earthquake which caught the attention of millions of people as it jostled the entire state. (And just to add a bit of macabre histrionics, our area experienced a mild shaking of our own just a few days post to the luncheon.)

She outlined her plan to an absorbed audience. "The decisions vou make shouldn't be emergencydriven," she stressed. "Planning in advance is the best strategy; always

have your important items at the ready." She then produced a "starter kit," explaining each item and the purpose it can serve. You can purchase the kits pre-made, she advised, and personalize them-home, car and work. She reeled off dozens of necessities and demonstrated by waving a can of water with a 50-year expiration date. She then reminded her constituents, "Don't forget your animals."

In a widespread emergency, she cautioned, don't count on the police. "Sometimes they can get to you, and sometimes they can't."

Wanda passed out sign up sheets deliverable to an emergency response team, and suggested that everyone learn how to perform certain tasks such as turning off water and gas. He audience was in tune and ready to respond.

several announcements from Vice Prez Renee Wagner filling in for Cynthia Rivera regarding upcoming lunches. Pat Gray addressed new monthly club meeting groups such as opera, knitting and movies, and asked for people to lead them. Kathy Kaminsky, chair of the Holiday Extravaganza, pitched an overview of desired silent auction items and asked for assistance in collecting them-a memorable start, and a new look for the CVWC!

TWO hundred and fifty years ago, Don Sebastian Vizcaino, Spanish soldier, explorer and entrepreneur, piloted his galleon into the commodious harbor in the Central Coast, to the amazement of native Americans who were members of over 200 tribes along the coastal inlets. Brooking no opposition, he named the rich landscape Monte Rey and claimed it for the Spanish Count under whose order he was sailing. The rest, as they say, is



history, and it comes alive when the CVWC presents its November lunch Wednesday, the 6th. Hours are 11:30 to 1:30 at the Gardener Ranch in Carmel Valley.

To facilitate the discussion, two speakers will be on hand: the first, is Laurie Huelga, Communications Manager for the City of Monterey, who is coordinating this year's series of historical ventures for the city. 

Friends of Cachagua Children's Center Promote Summer Programs

THE special programs aimed at providing summer enrichment for students in the Cachgua/Tassajara areas of Carmel Valley have made considerable progress in the past three years of its existence.

Its funding facilitator (and CVWC board member), Pat Gray, has been monitoring all the positive signs since its inception. From a first-hand account, she sees the program creating a positive influence on children in a variety of fields. This year there were sessions in science, art, yoga, sports and games. Field trips included Los Padres Dam, Hastings Reserva-



tion, Carmel Beach and Palo Corona Park.

"High school students were able to volunteer and earn community service hours," she says. "A healthy snack was provided each day and a pizza lunch was offered the last day. All of this is without charge to the families," she explained. "Without this support these youngsters wouldn't be able to afford these enrichment activities in a close-to-home setting."

The CVWC was instrumental earlier this year in providing a grant for the summer program. Pat noted that the Pebble Beach





Foundation became involved as well, donating funds to our local YMCA so that the organization could run the two-week summer camp this year for Cachagua Children's Center. The \$1,500 received from the CVWC was added to that to purchase supplies for art and science. Your CVWC dollars at work!



Want to Buy an Airport? Carmel Valley Beckons You

SPEAKING of funding, if you're interested in investing Big Time in this magnificent piece of land just east of the city of Carmel, this piece of heaven called Carmel Valley which many of us also call home, has an open air strip where many of us run, walk our dogs, picnic, store our supplies, welcome Santa (at Christmas, of course) ride our horses, and, most importantly, fight our fires and rescue our citizens, and it has a for sale sign on it. It's been there for at least 15 years.

The only thing this strip of land doesn't have on it is an airplane. And that's because it can't legally be used for an airport any longer. Reason: too close to Tularcitos Elementary School, and in its present condition, it doesn't pass the smell test for planes.

But it offers great promise for all of the other items mentioned, plus dozens of other potential events.

CVWC member Cynthia Hall is a member of the board of directors of the year-old Carmel Valley Save Open Space organization, established to find a means to purchase this property and turn it over to the Carmel Valley Parks District to maintain as an open public space for all to use. It served its purpose well (below), particularly for the devastating Basin fire of 2008. The sale price is around 3 million, give or take a hundred thousand, and Cynthia says, "It's a golden opportunity to purchase it and have that as a safety net for our community. The thing is to be proactive and purchase it now." The CVSOS is now a non-profit 501 (c) (3) and the board is looking for members, hopefully some from outside Carmel Valley.
