

ALONG with the robust salads, the Asian chicken, the Bay shrimp pasta and pita, the hit of the afternoon belonged to the two speakers who waxed eloquent about their subject: the upcoming 250th anniversary of the founding of the City Monterey. This all took place earlier in November when the CVWC celebrated its own luncheon at Gardener's Ranch in Carmel Valley Village.

Fifty dedicated luncheoners dined together at the ranch's poolside café and heard the City's Communications Manager, Laurie Huelga, and Ellen Martin, Executive Director of First Night Monterey, unveil plans for the year.

At 12 o'clock midnight, December 31st, the festivities will begin. First Night will headline the afternoon and evening with live music, theatrical presentations, poetry, children's productions and dance beginning at 3 pm and galloping into

the new year.

Visitors will have a chance to hear new stage presentations, including the Black Irish Band and a Monterey Symphony quartet, just two of over 25 groups performing at various places throughout the downtown Monterey area. Of course, food and other comestibles are available all evening long for both youth and adults.

The excitement is particularly heightened because the City's contribution to the evening involves speakers, live video feeds and historical presentations. The City has planned many special events which will premiere at New Years and continue throughout the year at historical sites. High on the list of activities scheduled is the City's Fourth of July birthday party. So if you are a history buff, you won't want to miss the historical reenactments, historic tours and a new public art unveiling surrounding that event.

Fireworks are, of course, a major part of any celebration, especially its 250th, so there will be many opportunities to observe these happenings all year long. Other activities: an art gala, a block party, a Fandango and much more. Music, marching and flag waving are definitely in the plans.





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

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# How Important is Our CV Airport? Here's a Recap of 2008

Now that the rains have started, everyone heaves a sign of relief and the terror of fire abates, maybe smolders, in our consciousness.

Having recently uncovered some of the pictures from the summer 2008 fire scare which encapsulated everyone in the Village, it seems appropriate to air them once again, and remind ourselves that this is occurring every summer in California, and that our little airport is put to good use when such horrors occur.

The bulk of the night fire shots were taken form the top

of El Caminito looking south. Nearly 900 firefighters from two battalions assigned to our little Carmel Valley airport valiantly rode in two directions for over a week, towards Tasajara to the East and into White Rock to the South, in hopes of surrounding and caging the red-eyed monster.

As the camp grew in size, so did the number of vehicles, and a small city came to life along the dusty road of the airport, providing the necessities of day-to-day living to its exhausted heroes. The stubble of the airport runway was ground to fine dust beneath the wheels of scores of huge semis—fire engines, laundry trucks, sleeping compartments, latrine carriers, garbage bins, catering transports—all part of a carefully engineered containment plan. Swaths 100 feet in width were cut into mountain tops in an effort to bring the fire under control and keep it from creeping down into the valley.

Then, in late July, as suddenly s it began, the fire was contained and crews began to herd the remnants of it eastward.

Its work here completed, the little city vanished, like Brigadoon, deeper into the ether of Carmel Valley. And although we were profoundly thankful they were present, we were also profoundly relieved to know they felt it was safe to move on.
