CVWC Wraps an Exciting Year with Winning Scholars for Lunch



With a collective whoop, over 60 people crowdsourced the final—and only lunch meeting of the Carmel Valley Women's Club 2020-21 season at Los Laureles in June. CVWC members braved the balmy, sunny afternoon to celebrate the winners of the club's 72nd scholarship lunch.

To say this was a breakaway moment was to define one and a half years' worth of cloistered living bursting forth into free access to actually shake hands, hug and speak directly to one another.

The main attraction was the awarding of over \$20,000 in scholarships to nine excellent female candidates on their way to colleges and universities in the fall.

The club's foundation which had collected and allocated the gifts for the scholarship fund, was there to hand out awards.

Scholarship chair, Anne Cowles, welcomed four of the winners who were present with their families It was a welcome sign that things were returning to normal and the Covid fear that had splintered the entire area was on its way elsewhere.

Ann Cowles headed the scholarship committee, joined by Connie Hong-Smith and Cynthia Rivera. The three interviewed over a dozen bright, young graduates, selecting nine to benefit from the CVWC Foundation's largesse. One was a winner two years ago, when she began her pre-college studies. She reapplied with excellent grades, qualifying to finish up in marketing and management at Sonoma State.

The three others who were present told their audience of goals and interests they hoped to pursue: Emily Wooler, is headed for Oregon University to study psychology; Eden Laine is checking into Arizona State, and Samantha Scattini has signed onto journalism, still undecided about where.

Other winners had equally lofty goals—forestry, conservation, humanities, architecture. general sciences.

They dined with family members, posed for pictures, chatted with attendees, and generally confirmed to us all of the importance of our continuing scholarship program—something the CVWC does so well, year after year.


GEORGE SHILLINGER, a scientist, founder and president

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Profiles—Cody: The Cat's Meon



HAVE you heard about Cody? A familiar whiskered sort. A tough, roustabout with a swagger, a take-no-unsolicited-cattreats kinda guy, but still with a bit of the Beau Brummell personality—a true gentlecat who has achieved neighborhood class status. He resides at White Oak in Carmel Valley Village. From there, he ventures forth.

He is ageless. There is not an inch of his little black and white body that isn't in need of a scratch, a pat or a cuddle, and that keeps him on the move.

He came to this author's attention when he popped over the backyard fence into the lap of Jackie Lynch one evening around cocktail time. After a few stretches and yawns, he sat blinking on her deck, while he was rubbed, petted and fussed over. Jackie is one of his many supporters, all of whom keep an eye on him.

At that point, no one was actually sure who he really lived with, but depending on the time of day, he might be breakfasting with Jackie, taking an unplanned lunch with a neighbor down the block, or an unscheduled dinner with a friendly family across the street. Evening sleepovers were spent with Jackie or her next door neighbors.

When Cody was missing (which occasionally happened), everyone fussed. (Cody's private life was, well, private, but there was great and continual speculation.)

A circumstance of serious concern came when the entire Village of Carmel Valley was forced to evacuate in summer 2020 due to the wildfire threat. As people packed bags and boxes, suitcases and folders carrying precious memorabilia and documents, not a thought was given to the little feline forager. Police cars cruised nearby, shooing everyone into action. Cars were loaded, police put locks on doors and everyone was hustled out.

This author and Jackie headed for comparative safety in the hills of Tierra Grande. As we were ushered out of town, neither of us thought about Cody. He was on his own.


...Until the next day, when we both exclaimed, "Where is Cody?" It's not easy outsmarting the police who don't want you back to visit. So it took a bit of planning to sneak back in via car. When we were finally apprehended, an officer asked what we thought we were doing. Did we know there was an evacuation? If we forgot something, didn't we know it was not within reach? We stated our mission and he said, "Animals know how to get out of the way of danger," an insipid analysis, we thought, of a critical time.

When we finally made our way back to White Oak, the streets were empty. It didn't take longer than one shout to find Cody waiting. He was thinner, dirtier, and he had lost a bit of *joie de vivre*. But he was ready to forgive and ready to join us for a repast. And although he had recovered from his abandonment, his circumstances had changed.


It turned out Cody did have a family; they did reside in White Oak; there was a relationship, no matter how strained, with this sophisticated, acclimated cat. Suddenly he sported a collar and a micro-chip, and there was a for sale sign on the property he had occasionally called home. Within less than a week, he disappeared like a fly in the mouth of a frog. Gone. Family missing.

Alerts were issued and a relative was found who explained that Cody had been "relocated" (stolen, claimed Jackie) to Arizona.

Jackie was devastated, but clear-eyed about her intention to locate her cat. The relative stayed in touch, informing Jackie that Cody's former owners had met with disaster, with one of them passing away, and the other, abandoning any interest in caring for their charge.






