
deteriorated condition in 1850, when it faced physical ruin. It was then the newly formed state of California, called it its own. You won't want to miss the saga of its restoration up to the present.

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Profiles—Helayne Williams



WHEN asked about her lifetime occupation, the business of health care, Helayne Williams, the new Vice President of Programming for the CVWC, gives a frank response: "How boring is that?" she questions. Not very, when you learn of her many years in Orthopedic management.

Helayne is from Los Angeles, where she grew up with three siblings, all in different occupations. Her father was in commercial lighting, a business he inherited from his father called Solar Lighting. Her mother managed the iconic Blum's Restaurant in LA's I Magnin.

Helayne's interest in the medical field mushroomed from her first job as a file clerk in a pediatrician's office while she was in high school. "The medical field always interested me from that little job," she says. "I chose the avenue of medical business—and medicine *is* a business—whether you're assisting a physician in an office, or presenting a new hospital surgical suite."

She was educated at San Jose State and graduated from University of San Francisco. She began her career in San Jose, where she also met her husband, Alan. He was at the home of his brother, which was just behind her house in San Jose. They met in his back yard. He liked what he saw; he asked her out; two years later, they were married. (Alan's brother remarked later on, "I should have asked her out first.")

Alan was a high school teacher and basketball coach.

They raised their three children in San Jose.

Helayne was connected with the San Jose Medical Center where she managed the Office of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. "My entire career has been in the medical field," she says. "For 20 years I was the Administrator of two major Orthopedic Groups in the San Francisco Bay area with as many as eight offices and over a hundred employees. My career consumed most of my time."

After 32 years, as an educator, Alan retired in 2004. Meanwhile, Helanye continued to work and her husband decided to handle the home front.

"He was great," says Helanye. He did all the housework, the shopping, the cooking, laundry."

It wasn't until 2003 when fate stepped in. She was offered a job with the Gastroenterology Group here in Monterey. She wasn't looking to make a change, but they had always enjoyed coming to the little Monterey Peninsula near the sea. "We never imagined we'd have the opportunity to live here," she says, "but when this job offer came along, we looked at each other and said, 'What are we waiting for?" That was 2003.

She worked with the group in medical administration for 16 years until she retired in 2019.

After retirement, she was determined to get involved in the community. When she was working, she had no time to make friends outside her little circle of associates through her business. She was ready to strike out. She wanted to broaden her friendships and find ways to give back to the community.


A CVWC club member who lived close to her, Judie Riley, thought she'd enjoy the club. "She told me she had been involved with the board for many years and insisted it was the best way to get to know people, so here I am. I joined in early 2019." She understands a lot of the members have known each other for many years. "I don't have that background," she says, "but I'm ready to make new friends."

Her "job" as Program Chair, she feels will allow her to get out and meet. She's looking forward to digging around for new and interesting luncheon speakers. She and Alan also want to make up for time lost in the past year.



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




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
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Mary Chamberlin's Love: Food

The illustrations are a delight and a fantasy of food. This book will promise to be a favorite for holiday giving.

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
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

And if you have a chance, take a stroll around the entire premises. The plants are worth the trek.




CVWC New 2021-22 Directory
